History:

- The original name was Decoration Day, due to people decorating the graves of veterans on this day.
- First observed on May 30, 1868 to commemorate those who had died in the Civil War.
- Memorial Day was declared a federal holiday in 1971 as the last Monday in May.
- The 3rd U.S. Infantry places small American flags on over 260,000 gravestones at Arlington National Cemetery on the Thursday before Memorial Day. This has been tradition since the late 1950s.
